If you already have skills you can use like quilting, applique, embroidery, knitting, crotchet weaving, printing that's great, but I can help with techniques you can use to show your ideas if you don't know how to make your idea.









Remember you don't need any art experience, Some really amazing works of art were made by ' naive artists.'


These were people who had no training in art skills they just had lots of interesting ideas and just loved to try out ways of showing these













### Mood board

### Design sketches

There are lots of ways to put down ideas . You don't have to be a great at drawing to do this.

Start by putting a load of ideas down





You can then REFINE AND DEVELOP these into a finished idea





# There are lots of ways you can have a go at making your work. Here are some of the ways you can try; PRINTING ON FABRIC

- **INK OR PAINT** You will need some kind of Thicker paint like emulsion or acrylic works better.
- **POTOTO OR SWEET POTATO** You can trace or draw your motifs onto a potato and cut the design in. Please be very careful if you are using anything sharp to do this and only under supervision.
- **PLOYSTERENE OR LINO**; Pizzas and other items often come packaged with polystyrene bases. You can reuse this. Using a pen or pencil scratch your design into the surface, cut it out and stick it on card.
- CARDBOARD. You can cut out and glue layers of card to build up a textured surface.
- STRING OR WOOL. You can stick this onto cardboard like corrugated packaging
- **SOMETHING TO PRINT ON**; You could use fabric, like an old pillow case/ sheet or card board, newspaper ect.

**Relief print** is done by raising areas up. You can do this by sticking card or string / wool onto a card board surface to make your design motif

## APPLIQUE AND COLLAGE TECHNIQUES. Applique is a traditional technique used in Textiles

- Applique means adding pieces of fabric by sewing or sticking them on to a larger piece to form a picture or pattern.
- Collage is art made by sticking various different materials such as photographs and pieces of paper or fabric on to a backing.

# Step 2 Use the drawing or tracing as a TEMPLATE. Cut it up so you can use it to cut out your collage materials or fabrics.

Cut up your tracing so you can use a paper templates to cut fabrics or recycled papers.

Plan your COLOURS, PATTERNS AND

TEXTURES CAREFULLY

You can pin or draw round the templates



✓ Cut fabric pieces using a paper template ✓ You don't need to use bonda web. You can use pins to attach the cut out fabric ✓ Use Zig zag stitch as shown in the video to sew over the edges.

You can also sew the pieces by hand using different stitches






